RESCUE REPORT (June 2020-August 2021)

BERNER, inc. continues to carry on rescues, fosters, adoptions, and education during the second year of the Covid-19 pandemic. All but two of the Berners we took into our rescue program came with health and behavior (mainly handling) issues. Four were "pandemic puppies" bought online by people working from home. We have had to reject more Berners for rehoming than we ever have (discussed in the "Trends" section).

TRENDS

Online Sales. Online sales of Berners by brokers for puppy mills continue at a high level. Social media continues to make it possible for puppy millers, backyard breeders, and independent high-volume breeders, such as Amish farmers, to sell puppies sight-unseen to uninformed, unprepared first-time Berner puppy buyers. Many of these puppies have undisclosed health and temperament disorders. BERNER Inc. continues to urge our adopters and BMDCNV club members to educate their friends and the public about the abuses of for-profit-only kennels and breeders.

Aggressive Berners and Bite Histories. An alarming national trend is a significant increase in calls to Berner rescues for rehoming aggressive Berners, most with bite histories. BMDCA's rescue network is sharing information and discussing this alarming trend. This past year I had to reject several Berners with very serious bite histories. One dog had attacked a stranger, who was hospitalized with a concussion and required many stitches. One dog had bitten his owner, her boyfriend, and a neighbor, all of whom ended up in the ER. One Berner had bitten every family member, including the 4-year-old youngest child. Some owners called Rescue as victims of their dog's bites were suing them. Some called after their Berners were impounded and quarantined by Animal Control or legally designated as dangerous dogs. Some called to rehome their Berners even after their veterinarians, trainers, and behavior specialists recommended euthanasia because the dogs could not be treated and would always be at high risk for causing serious physical harm to humans and other animals. Obviously, no rescue can rehome these dogs. Once a dog has a severe bite history, the likelihood of biting again is very high, and bites generally increase in intensity and injury with each succeeding incident.

A common thread in these aggressive Berners is, of course, bad breeding. These dogs are bred in puppy mills, barns, or backyards with no regard for genetic integrity. Then they're kept in seclusion and confinement, lacking vital socialization. After that, they're flown or trucked all over the country, direct to buyers and some to pet stores. Buyers of these Berners generally have no experience in how to choose sound puppies. They have no knowledge of how to handle their puppies' lack of early socialization and behavior issues. They do nothing to address the problems until the dog is beyond rehabilitation. Worse, many buyers know about the negatives of buying a puppy online from a broker and don't want to wait for a puppy from a responsible breeder. Often they don't want to pay the cost of a properly bred puppy (although to take advantage of demand, puppy mill breeders and their online brokers are escalating their purchase prices, some as high as \$3,000).

Another factor in the rise of aggressive Berners is the unfortunate popularity of "boot camps" to "solve" problems of acting out and the onset of aggressive behavior. Most of the Berners I had to reject had been sent to "camp" where they were "trained" on electric shock collars for two weeks or more. They



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came home subdued but not trained to do anything except fear the constant shocks ineptly inflicted by their owners. All these dogs did their worst biting after they came back from camp. In addition to the electric shock collar training devices was the use of Invisible Fences. The use of both of these training methods meant regular shocking when the dog went near the invisible fence line. All these dogs eventually breached the electric fences and attacked neighbors, strangers, and other animals.

It's heartbreaking for Rescue organizations to take these calls and explain to the desperate owners why their dogs cannot be retrained and rehomed. It's frustrating for rescues because even if there's an outside chance that aggressive Berners could be rehabilitated and rehomed, it takes veterinary behaviorists and highly skilled positive reinforcement trainers concentrating on aggressive behavior to work with them. Fosters and adopters experienced in handling aggressive dogs and rehabbing them are rare.

We can help prevent the influx of more aggressive Berners by educating people about the critical importance of temperament in Berners. The risk of getting a Berner with a faulty temperament is high with online sales of puppy mill dogs. We also need to educate people about the dangers and cruelty of force-based training. We need to alert them to the deceptive claims of force-based "boot camps."

BERNER, Inc. took Bruce into rescue and arranged to have his corrective surgery performed. (The surrendering owners generously paid for the surgery. Bruce had been bought through a national online puppy-selling chain that agreed to refund Bruce's buyers the purchase price.) The owners' young children would not understand that they couldn't play with Bruce as they had been. After surgery, it was possible that Bruce would not have the stamina to live in a home with active kids.

During his surgery and pre/post-op care, the vet tech who worked with Bruce's surgeon fell in love with him. She applied to adopt Bruce, and we agreed that living with an experienced orthopedic vet tech would be the best home for Bruce. She reports that "Bruce is doing absolutely amazing and we couldn't love him more!"

Rescue Chair's Note: Bruce was surrendered to BERNER, Inc. because he needed significant corrective surgery on his front legs. His first owners have small children and work full time. They felt that Bruce needed to be in a home where he could get full-time post-operative care. As a young, energetic Berner, Bruce would need to be kept still and quiet as he recovered.

Dolly spent several days scouring every square inch of the house and yard searching for her buddy but has settled in nicely to being an only dog. Dolly has met and charmed all the neighbors, human and canine, for blocks around. It did not take long for her to read all our routines. She can hear deli paper two rooms away! Shortly after arriving here, she took a liking to the teak bench on the deck. She loves to stand on it and use it for a grooming bench. If I don't grab the brush quickly enough, she will attempt to get it for me. She absolutely loves when we have company, but she is not keen to share the bench. If a guest decides to sit there, they

will soon be sharing it with a big dog. Once when I sat there, she tried to push me off (was not successful). Rescue Chair's Note: Dolly and Basel were adopted after their owner, longtime BMDCNV club member, Anita O'Neil, passed away. Martha Phelps recommended Terry and

Cadi



VOLUNTEERS NEEDED!

BERNER Inc. is *always* looking for volunteers. Our rescued Berners need you!

*Fostering a Berner rescue can be time-consuming and demanding, but also joyful and rewarding! Many of our foster dogs simply need some remedial training, such as basic house manners work. Some just need a place to stay until they go to their new homes. We may need a temporary foster home for a Berner recovering from surgery or spay/neutering. We may need a foster for a "hospice Berner" who needs a home during the last days of a terminal illness.

*BERNER, Inc. has an ongoing, urgent need for experienced people to foster and work with Berners with behavior problems. Some of our rescued Berners need work on challenging behavior issues such as hard mouthing/grabbing/jumping, leash-grabbing/hard pulling and resource guarding. Some rescues are shy, fearful and under-socialized. You may be fostering one of these dogs for an extended period of time. Previous experience with rehabbing a dog with behavior issues is required for fostering these Berners. BERNER Inc. provides training assistance for these foster dogs, if needed.

Fostering a Berner can be hard, but the rewards are great. You can be a vital part in turning a rescued Berner into an

adoptable dog who's ready for a loving, permanent home. Some fosters become "failed fosters," meaning that they fall in love with their foster Berners and adopt them!

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Inc. is very helpful to us. You'll be checking the home environment to see if it's secure, safe and suitable for a Berner. After your home visit you'll discuss your observations with the Rescue Chair. We will provide you with guidelines and a checklist.

*Transporting a Berner from one place to another is very helpful to BERNER Inc. You may pick up a dog at the surrendering owner's home and transport that dog to a foster home. Some dogs need to be picked up at shelters or veterinarian's offices and brought to their foster homes. Required is the ability to handle a Berner who may be stressed or over-excited. Also the willingness to drive occasional long distances!

*Helping at BMDCNV club events is another way to support BERNER, Inc. There are a number of one-day jobs that are helpful at events. You also get to talk to event-goers about what's involved in living with a Berner, especially if you've adopted one.
